More grass as summer proceeds suggests that the odd wedge may come out into the open occasionally. Now wouldn't that be something to behold at Royal Straddie.

From the President's Desk

Most of us have been at some time swooped and chastised by the Club's resident plovers during the nesting season. Getting too close to nest sites or the hatched chicks is sure to elicit protective behaviour in the breeding pair and any of the adult siblings from last year's breeding circle who remain in the family group.

Plover siblings play an important part in raising the chicks by providing additional lookout and back-up attack forces in the home territory. The siblings are tolerated by the breeding pair until one of the breeding pair dies and is used to replace the lost parent. If too many siblings survive in the home territory, the breeding pair chase the adult birds out. These birds then take up new territory forming pairs or joining other pairs, thus cutting out the inbreeding that would occur otherwise.

So why am I telling you this. We have 8 breeding pairs or territories on the course. I have noticed that over the last couple of years that the survival rate of the chicks has reached zero. WHY? Well, the major predators on the course are the goannas followed by the butcher birds, kookaburras and hawks, and I am sad to say, by we humans. We have cleared some of the rough areas by over-slashing and reducing the ground cover to minimise cart damage. This ground cover is needed by the chicks to survive the early stages of development. We are addressing this situation by blocking cart access to these areas by logging off or using tyres to close off those sensitive areas to cart traffic and only slashing once a year in the off-breeding

You can be Santa to the plovers this year by not leaving the fairways and by sticking to the tracks provided. Get some exercise and walk to your ball in the rough and remind all who use the course, if you see them, that carts in the rough are not on. Have a merry Christmas!

That's it. See you about the course.
