From the President's Desk

The year is rapidly closing in on Christmas. You also know that when the Rainbow Bee-eaters return to the course, summer is not far behind.

Pleasing to see that users of the course are generally avoiding their marked nest sites. Not many would expect or know that these birds return each year to nesting sites about the course mainly on the fairways in 1.5 meter long tunnels that the female excavates, while the male feeds her from the abundant insects, taken on the wing that also call NSI home. The rhythm of life continues.

This month we have had to remove and replace the Club's bore pump. The pump lies 125m below the surface and is located down by the entrance to the course. The pump is 25m under the water in a large fresh water aquifer. The pictures show the difficulty in raising the 180kg, 2.1m pump and 125m of flat hose which is attached to the pump to bring the water to the surface and into our above ground tanks adjacent to the Clubhouse.

The following three pictures show how the old tractor was used to raise the hose and the pump hydraulically from the bore. Connection with the hose was followed by reversing the tractor and pulling the hose away from the bore until the pump itself was exposed. All of this was time consuming and fraught with potential danger because the trick is not to lose the pump down the bore hole.







Losing the pump would mean a new bore hole and a new pump (cost north of \$120,000). As things turned out, we had to raise and lower the pump twice. We, that is the 3 of us doing the job, learnt plenty and are not keen to spin the wheel of fortune any time soon. Eight years have passed since we replaced the last pump in the middle of the bushfires that consumed 80% of the Island. The wash up this time is that we have only to replace 25m of cable and we will have 2 pumps again - one down the bore hole and one on standby.

The course and clubhouse are improving as time and money allow. We get many comments praising the Club for its presentation, especially the condition of the greens which are far above what visitors have said they were expecting and comparable, if not better than their own club greens. As many of these visitors come from all over Australia and indeed the world, they are a ready-made source of free advertising. All clubs are judged by the condition of the greens regardless of season.

That's it from me. See you about the course.

An App for Emergencies

Now here's something a bit different from me. It's about a New App called the **Emergencyplus App.** It's a good story which should be heard by our members. Our exposure to the benefits of this App came up during a regular meeting of the Club's Risk Assessment Management Sub-committee — a meeting which occurs monthly to address any risks associated with play and visitation to the Clubhouse and Golf Course. The Club has an obligation to maintain a comprehensive risk management plan given the activities which take place on our leasehold. Being able to attend to unforeseen medical emergencies is an ever-present risk requiring ambulance attendance expeditiously. Hence our interest in the **Emergencyplus App**.

After an information session with the local Ambulance officers organised through the RAMP Committee, the App was downloaded on many phones. Within 2 hours one such recipient used it to have an ambulance arrive in quick time to assist with a friend who had a fall and sustained a serious ankle injury.

How does it work?

The Emergencyplus App uses GPS functionality built into smartphones and it gives the emergency dispatcher your exact location, including the exact co-ordinates - so there is no doubt over your precise whereabouts.

If you are travelling or in an unfamiliar location and need help, it can be hard to know exactly where you are, and often difficult for you to describe accurately when stressed. Now, a charged smartphone will do the job. We suggest you download it immediately!!

Just go to your APP Store and type in: **Emergencyplus.**


